SPM: How did you get started in music? Was there music in your family?



how everything kind of got started.

David: According to my father, my grandmother used to sing but I never met her. At the age of 8 years old my grandfather bought me a guitar and I took a couple of classes but that was about it. At the age of 12 I had this little record player under my pillow and I heard something that went straight to my heart. I went home and got my Spanish guitar and I took the nylon strings off and I put an electric guitar strings. I remember going out and seeing this older kid who was 15 years old at the time, I was only 12 and to see him play this red electric guitar was amazing and, I said no way this kid is only 15 and knows how to play the guitar that well. I also remember how very touching that was to me. I went to Hollywood California and at that point I already knew what I wanted to do. My dad wanted me to be a pilot and I just really wanted to have music in my life and, that's David: There are a lot of them – I could write you a book. I play music everyday of my life and I practice a lot, I pretty much live for the music. I don't watch TV, I don't care a lot about sports, and my whole life has been about music on the string guitar. You just have to follow the music and the blessings will come. When I moved to Los Angeles I didn't know a lot of guitar players and I made a lot of changes in my life and I got into blues. When I moved to the Bay Area I used to play at this club on Thursday nights and there was this guitar player. Some of the other bands would let me play with them but I decided to try to play on Thursdays, Fridays, and Saturday nights. The owner asked me if I could play blues and then I came out with this album and it's finally what I really want to put out. And, I really explored the direction I wanted to go with this album. The mix of everything it has a lot of Blues in it and I think to myself that I play a lot of things but, I get inspired by lot of people and finally I came up with my own songs in my own style for the first time in my life. I could say that I've reached what I was looking for what and what I admire the most is my confidence in who I am.

SPM: You say this album is the real you but, will you do another album in the future?

David: God has blessed me with the first one but I would be Iying if I said no I wouldn't. This record was a lot of work, a lot of money. But, this album has opened a lot of doors for me. After a finished album, I have to take a break from the album because I listen to it for a couple of weeks and sometimes when you listen to it you get to close to the same song. That's when I take a break and then I go back and hear it again later after some time away. But yes, I will do more music. I'm just enjoying what I've done and the music I'm able to share.

SPM: Do you think you would classify yourself as a perfectionist in this album?

David: That's a tough question for me to answer. I'm fluent with myself and I never think of myself as good when I stop trying to make something better. Or, when you stop being you, I had fans that carried me all the way here. That's the only thing that money cannot buy. Yes it's a good album, but maybe on the next one I will try to be even better, who knows.

SPM:: So you're going to take a break and then come back to do another album?

David: Yes, let me just say I'm already writing songs. I know what I want, so we'll just see what happens.

But this time I'm hoping to reach a different market. I used to be afraid to show myself – to flourish and show off what I could do. But I've learned it's better to embrace it then to try to suppress it. I know I play different because I am different and, I was hearing that from a lot of people from the first time I started play. I've accepted it and I'm truly happy with who I am.

SPM: With this new album you said you wanted reach a new market. What do you want people to take away from this particular project?

David: They knew am different. I just want them to accept that they're going to get the best of me and what I love to do. And, I do this from the time I wake up to the time I go to bed. There's a lot of honesty in this album, and I know this is the best I can do.

SPM: What should we expect from you in the near future?

David: More touring, more shows, and hopefully a new album.
